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Abstract

- Explored appropriate smartphone use for academic work
 - In class, out of class
- 3 focus groups
 - Students with and students without disabilities
 - Campus professionals
- Results
 - Multiple academic uses for students' smartphones
 - Professors, professionals not always aware of these
 - Students with and without disabilities use same apps
 - Students with disabilities also use specialized apps





Rationale

- Virtually all college students bring a smartphone to class
- Needed to explore how students use these appropriately
 - In class
 - Out of class





Method

- 3 focus groups
 - 7 college students with disabilities
 - 6 nondisabled college students
 - 9 campus professionals
- Questions centered on schoolwork
 - What mobile technologies and apps students use in class
 - What mobile technologies students use outside class
- Transcript notes were coded

	Check the course management system
Record lectures	Use Google Drive, Google Docs to collaborate
Follow along with the PowerPoint	Participate in course blog
Take pictures of diagrams and formulas on whiteboard	Start writing essays on smartphone during commute
	Dictate essay
Take pictures of PowerPoint slides	Access online library services
Take notes in class	Research assignments (e.g., Google Search)
	Use Turnitin
Use Google Translate	Submit assignments online
Access a dictionary or thesaurus	Do exams
Respond to professor-initiated activities (e.g., polling)	Read ebooks
	Review course PowerPoint or Google Slides
Group work (e.g. Google Docs)	Make flash cards to study
Complete online quiz	Listen to voice recording of PowerPoint
	Watch videos posted by the professor
View high resolution images	Provide proof (e.g. selfie at a museum)
